FIM Sidecar Motocross World Championship

2020 Calendar - UPDATE 13 March

Due to the ongoing outbreak of the Coronavirus, the FIM, the Promoter APO Multimedia, the Dutch Motorcycle Federation (KMNV), the Czech Motorcycle Federation (ACCR), the Belgian Motorcycle Federation (FMB), the French Motorcycle Federation (FFM) and the local organisers have taken the decision to make the following changes to the 2020 calendar:

- Oss (NED) - Initially scheduled on 18-19 April, **postponed to 13-14 June**
- Kramolin (CZE) - Initially scheduled on 9-10 May, **postponed to 20-21 June**
- Iffendic (FRA) - **Date to be confirmed as soon as possible**
- Lommel (BEL) - Initially scheduled to take place on 20-21 June, **cancelled**
